

Vision West ND is conducting a food hub feasibility study through a USDA Rural Business Development Grant. This study is part of an overall strategy by Vision West ND to help communities diversify their local economies and build local economic resilience. The purpose of a food hub is to create opportunities to supply *locally grown* products into the *local* economy. Food hubs are more than CSAs and Farmers Markets. Food Hubs focus on product aggregation to meet a larger consumer demand such as schools, hospitals, grocery stores, restaurants, etc.

The USDA defines a food hub as: "a business or organization that actively manages the aggregation, distribution, and marketing of source-identified food products primarily from local and regional producers to strengthen their ability to satisfy wholesale, retail, and institutional demand."



### Food hubs can:

- Provide a link between farmers, producers, and buyers.
- Give individual farmers and producers the means to market and sell their products together as one larger entity, allowing them the opportunity to sell to high-volume buyers.
- Offer farmers and producers the ability to receive fair and consistent pricing for their products.
- Provide larger buyers with a supplier that can, not only meet high levels of demand, but can also consistently provide fresh local foods.
- Educate buyers about food and facilitate information flow and sharing.
- Help farmers extend their season which, in turn, helps provide buyers with a more consistent supply of product.
